Who are we?



In South Africa, less than 20% of sources quoted in the news are women: our online database of woman+ experts is working to change that. Why the + after Woman? Because our database is open to any expert in any field from any part of our society who identifies their voice with the project's values and aims.



NPC that links journalists to a database of leading women experts that we curate from mainly from South Africa, but more recently from across Southern Africa

We lobby media to look beyond their male sound-bite stars for sources and we monitor for biases that show in news reporting

Currently, there is no cost to experts for being on our database, or to reporters for using it.

We train women to feel safe in the media - or any - spotlight

We've partnering with experts to build the body of knowledge journalists have as a basis for reporting. (As soon as we can find \$\$\$, 15 women scientists will provide a COVID training webinar for student/young journalists, community, & new media players on vaccines, Covid-19 long term complications, treatment, and testing

The "+" in our name covers the fact that our database is open - beyond womento all voices marginalised in mainstream news. Whether because of living with disability; or sexual identity, gender orientation; poverty; education: rural location: or anything else.


# Why this news **misogyny**?
